Counterfeit 100's and 20's being passed in our area.

The D'Iberville Police Department is advising our businesses and citizens to be cautious, when receiving change during a money transaction. We have had two separate cases in the past week, where suspects have passed counterfeit 100's and 20's. Please take your time and inspect the money during your transaction and as always we encourage our citizens to call the D'Iberville Police immediately about all suspicious activity.

KNOW YOUR MONEY

How to Detect Counterfeit Money

The public has a role in maintaining the integrity of U.S. currency. You can help guard against the threat from counterfeiters by becoming more familiar with United States currency.

Look at the money you receive. Compare a suspect note with a genuine note of the same denomination and series, paying attention to the quality of printing and paper characteristics. Look for differences, not similarities.

Portrait

The genuine portrait appears lifelike and stands out distinctly from the background. The counterfeit portrait is usually lifeless and flat. Details merge into the background which is often too dark or mottled.



Federal Reserve and Treasury Seals

On a genuine bill, the saw-tooth points of the Federal Reserve and Treasury seals are clear, distinct, and sharp. The counterfeit seals may have uneven, blunt, or broken saw-tooth points.



Border

The fine lines in the border of a genuine bill are clear and unbroken. On the counterfeit, the lines in the outer margin and scrollwork may be blurred and indistinct.

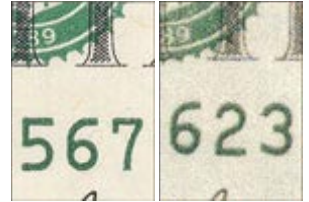

Serial Numbers

Genuine serial numbers have a distinctive style and are evenly spaced. The serial numbers are printed in the same ink color as the Treasury Seal. On a counterfeit, the serial numbers may differ in color or shade of ink from the Treasury seal. The numbers may not be uniformly spaced or aligned.



Paper

Genuine currency paper has tiny red and blue fibers embedded throughout. Often counterfeiters try to simulate these fibers by printing tiny red and blue lines on their paper. Close inspection reveals, however, that on the counterfeit note the lines are printed on the surface, not embedded in the paper. It is illegal to reproduce the distinctive paper used in the manufacturing of United States currency



KNOW YOUR MONEY

If You Receive a Counterfeit

- Do not return it to the passer.
- Delay the passer if possible.
- Observe the passer's description, as well as that of any companions, and the license plate numbers of any vehicles used.
- Contact your local police department or [United States Secret Service field office](#). These numbers can be found on the inside front page of your local telephone directory.
- Write your initials and the date in the white border areas of the suspect note.
- Limit the handling of the note. Carefully place it in a protective covering, such as an envelope.
- Surrender the note or coin only to a properly identified police officer or a U.S. Secret Service special agent.

Search is on for naked man

Police want the public's help to identify a naked, armed man who attacked a woman, Monday June 15, 2009, at a sand bar on the north end of Riverside Drive. The only thing he was wearing was a camouflage mask over his face. The victim and witnesses otherwise described him as white, 6 feet tall, 250 pounds and pot-bellied.

"This is a very dangerous person," said Police Chief Wayne Payne.

The woman, in her 20s, had spent the day sunning at The Cliff, an area known by locals as Redneck Beach. The sand bar is on the east side of the Tchoutacabouffa River near Lamey Bridge Road. The woman told police she was walking to her vehicle around 6 p.m. when a naked man with a shotgun or rifle jumped out from behind a tree. The man ordered her to stop and she ran, but he chased the victim and eventually knocked her to the ground. The victim managed to fight off the attack and escape. The suspect was last seen running through the woods.

"We're warning people to be cautious and keep their eyes open for anyone acting suspicious."

Burglary of a motor vehicle is a crime of opportunity. Don't become a victim, protect your car and personal property.

- Residents are encouraged to call the D'Iberville Police immediately about all suspicious activity. Don't worry about feeling embarrassed if your suspicions are wrong; think instead about what could happen if your suspicions are right and you don't call. It is the Police Department's job to investigate suspicious matters, and any assistance in spotting suspicious persons or activities is greatly appreciated.

REMEMBER:

1. A thief can burglarize your vehicle in less than 30 seconds!
2. it only takes you about 20 seconds to at least move your valuables into your trunk, out of sight.
3. If you see someone committing a crime **Do Not** confront them, call the police immediately.
4. **Be** alert, **Be** aware, and be prepared to **Be** a good witness.

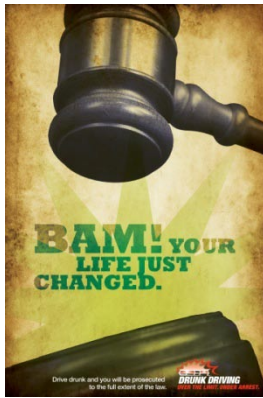
